# ANNE CROSS - 51 YEARS LATER

It's almost like yesterday when I think about it (which isn't often). Three years of mild illness, not definite whether Crohn's or colitis, three weeks in hospital in November 1969 when steroids seemed to have done the trick and all was normal again.

I married with medical approval December 1969 and then Wham! February 1970, aged 27 and two months

into married life a massive flare up of infection, bleeding, abscesses and finally a fistula sealed the decision to operate. The medics had struggled for nine weeks with me in hospital trying everything they knew to prevent me having surgery but in the end there was no choice if I didn't want to die.

Having never even known what a colostomy was up to that point, I was devastated to find out what was going to happen. I was in emotional turmoil wondering what my new husband would think, my family, friends, and my teaching colleagues. My perception of myself (never having been ill since childhood and with a very nice body) was that I would be a freak and second rate human being. In the end though, with no choice, the operation (panproctocolectomy with ileostomy) was performed on April 7<sup>th</sup> 1970...



Many tears were shed. I had lost four stones in weight and looked like a stick. With a body riddled with infection it was a risky procedure and in fact the enormous abscess in the wound post operatively caused healing problems and adhesions. The perineal wound had to be packed for some weeks and did not heal properly for 14 months. However, after I began to see that there was hope of recovery as I improved I decided that it was not going to break me and that I would give it my best shot to live as normally as possible. I slowly got back to being able to walk as being in bed for so long had made this difficult. I was fortunate to have a surgeon who knew about the Ileostomy Association and post operatively he arranged a visit from the secretary, Joyce Fitzpatrick, for which I am eternally grateful.

There were no stoma care nurses in those days and ileostomies were not common so to talk to someone with life experience of an ileostomy was a godsend. We talked about food, clothes, marital relations, having children, sport and I was able to contact her if anything cropped up that I wanted to talk about. It was roughly 2 years though before I felt normal and that everyone was not looking at my stomach. I joined IA and am extremely thankful for its support over the years.

In everyday life I determined not to talk about my "affliction" and in general don't tell people I have an ileostomy but it has been good to learn about and discuss ileostomy matters at IA meetings and I've made many good friends.

I was given 2 Salts black rubber bags after the op. – one worn and one to be ready when a change was needed.( Some people likened them to a hot water bottle!) Scrubbing out the used bag in readiness for the next change was the order of the day. The adhesive was liquid latex which was smoothed on to flange and skin and when dry the two were pressed together.

In light of today's disposable bags this seems a clumsy procedure but it was efficient and used to keep the bag on for up to 4 days. (I still have the original bag to remember!) Now of course I use disposable and by trial and error with many different bags over the years have found one that suits me perfectly. I am now able to keep my skin nice and keep the bag on for 6 or 7 days which means my life is very normal and the half hour I spend cleaning, airing, thoroughly washing and drying the peristomal skin when I do the change is well worth it.

I wasn't able to have children because of adhesions in the Fallopian tubes but God is good! We adopted two gorgeous boys and have 6 lovely grandchildren.

I have camped in fairly primitive conditions and have travelled all over the world and still do (aged 78) and have found no problem whatever travelling by plane. I have taken school trips abroad and shared rooms with colleagues who never knew I had an ileostomy. I used to swim and play tennis but now try to walk at least 2 miles a day for exercise. Life can still be good with an ileostomy! Thank you medics and IA.
