REPORT ON MAAF MEETING etc.

As our members will know, we have had, especially since lockdown, a number of our members advising us of problems when travelling through Manchester Airport's security. It would appear some of these problems initially were because of poor training of security staff which has now been addressed, and we have now begun to get reports from our members that they have had no problems, especially if you make sure you go up to the Assistance Reception Area at the airport and request a lanyard. This will identify you to staff as someone who may need additional support or understanding. Their staff have been specially trained to recognise the lanyards and act accordingly. Please note this lanyard permits access to our 'family' and priority lanes at security as well as the use of their assistance lanes at the UK border on arrival into Manchester Airport.

I attended a meeting for the Manchester Airport Accessibility Forum on 7th May, which I found to be very interesting and informative. The meeting was attended by various members of Manchester Airport personnel and representatives from seven charities. The outcome was that airport staff are making sure that anyone who needs assistance when at the airport receives whatever they require.

The agenda included details on service performance and customer feedback, Manchester Airport's business and strategic update and an update on innovation/accessibility work streams. I also found that they have put details online to help travellers who may need assistance and included tips for travelling with a stoma. This can be accessed by clicking on 'Manchester Airport Invisible Disabilities'.

Stomas - Tips for Travel

If you have a stoma, the prospect of completing security checks may seem daunting. Please be reassured that all of our security officers receive stoma awareness training, so you can be confident that you will be guided through the security process with dignity and care.

10 Useful Tips

- 1. Plan and prepare in advance of your trip.
- 2. Wrap cling film around liquid medication to prevent it leaking into other belongings.
- 3. Pack enough stoma bags better to have too many than not enough, and have extra in hand luggage in case your hold bag does not arrive at your destination.
- 4. Liquid stoma glue will fit in a clear liquid bag and you should always remove it from your hand luggage.
- 5. You can carry scissors in your hand luggage with a blade length less than 6 cm and with rounded ends.
- 6. At security, a private screening room is available you can request this if selected for a manual body search.
- 7. Wear loose clothing, remove belts and place these in the screening trays.
- 8. Carry medication delivery notes on your person as this details what the medication is.
- 9. There can be queues at security always be comfortable before entering the Security area.
- 10. Pack spare clothes in your hand luggage.

A recent 2-week stay in hospital due to a Crohn's flare up, made me fully aware of the dedication by doctors and nurses and supporting staff at Salford Royal



TRAVELLING WITH A CATHETER

One of our members asked if we could help as he was due to travel via Manchester Airport and has a catheter. We contacted the airport and they sent us the following advice, which may be of help if any of our other members are travelling with one. When you arrive at the airport they suggest that you go to the Accessibility Counter, and if you have not already got one, ask for one of the lanyards.

The 1 litre liquid limit does not apply to medication / medical equipment and having a GP letter helps validate this. At the security tray loading point, they suggest highlighting these items to the officer in this area and they will confirm whether or not these need to be in the tray separately (some of the lanes in Terminal 2 no longer require liquids to be taken out of bags).

If the catheters are automatically flagged by the system for a further check, you will just need to present the GP letter to the officer rescreening the tray. A lot of the security process is automated and even if staff are aware in advance, they will still need to potentially rescreen and check the medical letter if the system has flagged the liquid in a certain way.

Our member contacted us after his holiday and advised that he followed the advice given above and had no problems going through the airport and security.

This member was travelling to Turkey via Izmir Airport and he has reported that there are more security checks in place at this airport. The region of Izmir is considered to be a "hot spot" by the British government, and consequently, they have asked the Turkish authorities to perform a further security check when entering the boarding area. This check is both a physical check of your hand luggage and a body frisk (including in some instances, lifting of your shirt). This is a random search and the staff member who checks your passport and boarding card decides who is to be allowed straight through or to be searched. Fortunately, he was allowed to go straight through. Needless to say, this sort of search could be very embarrassing for people with stomas, as there were no facilities for searching in a private space.
